Please remember to follow the guidelines in the flyer that was sent to all public road residences. If piles are not in compliance with the leaf and bush program, they will not be picked up and a door hanger may be placed indicating what was found and correction action necessary, by the Code Enforcement Officer or Department of Public Works.

- Leaves must be unbagged (paper yard waste bags accepted).
- Leaves and brush <u>must be separated</u> and placed behind the curb or road edge of the paved portion of the roadway; however, it must be reachable with the leaf truck or grapple claw.
- Leaves and brush can be placed out up to, but not earlier than, three (3) days before scheduled pick-up. Leaves and brush placed out after 7:00 a.m. on the scheduled day will not be picked up.
- Brush must be stacked neatly in the same direction parallel to the road.
- Leave and brush piles must not exceed 8 feet in length, 6 feet in width, and 4 feet in height. If pile exceeds the required size, please separate them into multiple piles.
- Branches cannot be larger than 6 feet long and 6 inches in diameter.

2024 Leaf and Brush Pick-Up:

- Leaves must be unbagged (paper yard waste bags accepted).
- Leaves and brush <u>must be separated</u> and <u>placed behind the curb or road edge of the paved portion of the roadway</u>; however, it must be reachable with the leaf truck or grapple claw. (Leaves are picked up using a vacuum, while brush is picked up using a grapple claw. The leaf vac cannot pick-up anything but leaves. If leaves and brush are mixed, they will not be picked up and a courtesy notice may be placed at the location with directions on how to correct the issue for the next regularly scheduled pick-up.)
- Leaves and brush can be placed out up to, but not earlier than, three (3) days before scheduled pick-up. Leaves and brush placed out after 7:00 a.m. on the scheduled day will not be picked up.
- Brush must be stacked neatly in the same direction parallel to the road.
- Leave and brush piles must not exceed 8-feet in length, 6-feet in width, and 4-feet in height. If the pile exceeds the required size, please separate them into multiple piles.
- Branches cannot be larger than 6-feet long and 6-inches in diameter.

A Message from Saugatuck Township: Construction Begins on Blue Star Hwy Roundabout Wednesday, April 10th

On Wednesday, April 10th, the Allegan County Road Commission will begin construction on a new roundabout at the intersection of Blue Star Highway and Old Allegan Road. The intersection will be closed during the construction period with plans to reopen to local traffic on July 22nd. Covering a span of 0.33 miles, the single-lane roundabout is designed to optimize traffic movement efficiently and improve safety at the intersection. The approximately \$1.5 million project is funded through an MDOT safety grant, Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality grant and local match funds from the Allegan County Road Commission and Saugatuck Township.

During construction, a detour for Blue Star Highway will be established via Route I-196.

Designed by LRE Engineers, the roundabout includes four road islands, two of which are extended, and a 45 ft diameter center circle. With 23 ft of the center circle consisting of a mountable apron, the roundabout is designed to accommodate the types and volume of vehicles that currently frequent the road, including large trucks and emergency vehicles.

A traffic study completed in 2021 indicated a need for the inclusion of additional safety measures at this intersection given high seasonal traffic and the potential for increased pedestrian activity given plans to construct a non-motorized path along Blue Star Hwy.

A roundabout was specifically recommended, as roundabouts are recognized as a Proven Safety Countermeasure by the Federal Highway Administration for reducing speeds and conflicts, minimizing severe crashes, and offering more crossing points for non-motorized traffic.

In addition to the roundabout construction, the project includes the installation of an approximately 500 ft section of non-motorized trail on the west side of Blue Star Highway, as well as a pedestrian crossing south of the intersection. A concrete landing pad will be installed on the east side of Blue Star Highway in preparation for a future path connecting pedestrians to the Township's River Bluff Park.

Concurrently, Saugatuck Township has partnered with Viridis Design Group of Grand Rapids on a landscape design for the site. "Our goal was to integrate sustainable solutions into traditional infrastructure practices, seamlessly blending pedestrian and vehicular safety and circulation with the local ecology and artistic community" said Viridis landscape designer, Lindsey Gadbois. Design features include low-maintenance, drought resistant plantings such as dune grass, with hardscaping in the center of the road island.

"The location of the roundabout, with its proximity to Downtown Saugatuck and a growing Blue Star business corridor, presents an opportunity to create a welcoming gateway into the Saugatuck Township community," said Daniel DeFranco, Saugatuck Township Manager. This is the first time that the Allegan County Road Commission has partnered with a municipality on a landscape design for a road improvement project.

What is the New Sign at 200 Blue Star Highway? On February 20th, 2024, the Douglas City Council and the Douglas Brownfield Authority met together with Williams & Works, to discuss the results of the 200 Blue Star Highway public survey and public input session. Three conceptual designs were presented to the group and have been forwarded to the United States Environmental Protection Agency as a requirement for our clean-up grant. Residents who attended the meeting asked if the City could place a sign at the site indicating any progress that has been made. The sign was placed this week and states, "We're Moving Forward," and shows a depiction of the conceptual design that received the most support, with an explanation of where we are with the USEPA grant process. This project is going to take time, but we are indeed moving forward and will continue to make significant progress on the site. We appreciate everyone's patience.

The Douglas Brownfield Authority will meet in May to discuss the status of the project and USEPA grant with PM Environmental who is working with the City on the grant compliance.

415 Wiley Road: The City reissued requests to rehab the building at 415 Wiley Road with the goal of moving City Hall and the Douglas Police Department to the site. Seven proposals were received, and the City Council will be discussing them at a scheduled workshop meeting on Wednesday, April 17th at 5:30 p.m. at City Hall. No final decisions have been made.


Root Beer Barrel

2024 Leaf and Brush Pick-Up REMINDER: This is a reminder that leaf and brush pickup for 2024 will commence in April. Please remember to follow the guidelines in the flyer that was sent to all public road residences. If piles are not in compliance with the leaf and bush program, they will not be picked up and a door hanger may be placed indicating what was found and correction action necessary, by the Code Enforcement Officer or Department of Public Works.

- Leaves must be unbagged (paper yard waste bags accepted).
- Leaves and brush <u>must be separated</u> and placed behind the curb or road edge of the paved portion of the roadway; however, it must be reachable with the leaf truck or grapple claw.
- Leaves and brush can be placed out up to, but not earlier than, three (3) days before scheduled pick-up. Leaves and brush placed out after 7:00 a.m. on the scheduled day will not be picked up.
- Brush must be stacked neatly in the same direction parallel to the road.
- Leave and brush piles must not exceed 8 feet in length, 6 feet in width, and 4 feet in height. If the pile exceeds the required size, please separate them into multiple piles.
- Branches cannot be larger than 6 feet long and 6 inches in diameter.

200 Blue Star Highway- City Council/Douglas Brownfield Redevelopment Authority Joint Meeting: The City Council and Douglas Brownfield Redevelopment Authority meeting on Monday, February 5th, 2024, regarding the 200 Blue Star Highway survey and public input results was incredibly productive and a great step forward for the City and community.

A total of 467 responses were analyzed by the Williams & Works engineering and planning team, with the highest percentage of responses from individuals living inside the City of the Village of Douglas. Three concepts were generated, utilizing the thorough response data from the survey to create concepts for the public input session discussion. Out of the three concepts, one received the highest favorability with 41%, which included options for specialized commercial, mixed use, and small-scale apartments. 415 Wiley Road: The City Council turned down the proposal presented by ABM Building Solutions, LLC for the buildout of the 415 Wiley Road property for City Hall, Police, and Public Works.

The decision not to move forward with the rehabilitation project was reached after thorough consideration of numerous factors, with cost being a significant concern. While the proposal presented by ABM Building Solutions, LLC highlighted potential benefits, including the consolidation of municipal services into a single location, the associated financial requirements were deemed prohibitive at this time. Furthermore, the City is currently facing pressing capital needs across multiple areas, necessitating a strategic allocation of resources. We must prioritize projects that directly address critical infrastructure and service delivery demands to ensure the well-being and safety of our residents.

In light of these considerations, the City Council has opted to convene a workshop on Tuesday, February 20th, 2024, at 5:30 p.m. to explore alternative options for the site. This workshop will provide an opportunity for the council to collaboratively evaluate potential solutions that align with our community's needs and financial realities.

The City would like to emphasize that the decision not to proceed with the proposed rehabilitation project does not diminish Douglas's commitment to enhancing our municipal facilities and services. We remain dedicated to finding innovative and cost-effective solutions that best serve the interests of our residents and contribute to the overall prosperity of our City.

Thank you once again to ABM Building Solutions, LLC for their involvement in the process, and we look forward to engaging with the community and stakeholders as we work towards a viable path forward for the site.

Ferry Street: Limited Access on Ferry Street Bridge/Culvert

The City of Douglas remains steadfast in its commitment to ensuring the safety and well-being of our community. As part of our ongoing efforts to address infrastructure concerns, steel plates have been installed on the Ferry Street Bridge/Culvert. These plates have been placed exclusively to allow public safety vehicles to cross the bridge safely.

Please be aware that this temporary measure is intended strictly for emergency use. No passenger vehicles or any other types of traffic, apart from public safety vehicles, will be permitted to access the bridge. The area will be closely monitored, and any unauthorized vehicles will be ticketed.

Public safety has always been and will continue to be our top priority. While we have concerns about the weight the bridge can bear, these steel plates provide a temporary solution that allows our emergency responders to operate without interruption.

Pedestrians and cyclists may still cross the bridge at this time, but we urge everyone to use the designated paved area of the road on the east side of the bridge, which is currently marked. Bicyclists are strongly urged to walk bicycles across the bridge for safety reasons and we ask that all walkers/bicyclists avoid using the steel plate crossing. Please exercise extreme caution when approaching the area. There are marked warnings to help avoid any potential trip and fall hazards.

The next steps involve obtaining quotes to replace the culvert and advancing the project as quickly as possible. We understand the inconvenience this may cause and appreciate your cooperation and patience as we work towards a permanent solution. The City Engineers will be presenting a project update and proposal at the Douglas City Council meeting on Monday, August 19th, 2024, at 7:00 p.m. This meeting will also be available to attend via zoom. This decision follows the discovery of structural concerns at the bridge over the Warnock Drain, where a sinkhole recently appeared.

Ensuring the safety of our residents and travelers is Douglas's utmost priority. The closure is necessary to assess and address the underlying structural issues thoroughly. We understand that this may cause inconvenience, and we are committed to minimizing disruptions as much as possible.



415 Wiley Road: At the Tuesday, February 20th, 2024, City Council Workshop, the City administration was directed to resubmit public requests for proposals/bids for both the rehabilitation of the building, and options should the City demolish the property and build a new facility on the site.

Housing Stock: The City administration participated in a meeting this week with individuals from around the region, to discuss the need for affordable housing stock throughout Allegan County. It is estimated that 6000 homes/apartments are needed over the next five years to meet the current demand. The Douglas City Council is discussing opportunities for affordable, attainable, and workforce housing on the City's 17-acres off Wiley Road. This could become an opportunity for our community to participate in the housing shortage in the future.

Taft Law: At this week's City Council meeting, the Council approved to continue working with Taft Law (environmental attorneys) to identify those responsible for contaminating the 200 Blue Star property. It is our hope that a settlement can be reached that will aid the City with our goal to clean the property up and make room for future development.

Capital Improvements: Please tune into the last Council meeting where you can hear presentations by the City's engineering firm, Prein & Newhof, about the state of our roads and water system, and the need to make critical investments in both areas. The meetings can be accessed by visiting the City's website at - https://douglas-mi.municodemeetings.com/

Water Charges: As part of our ongoing commitment to providing residents and businesses with reliable and high-quality water services, the City Council approved a water rate increase in November of 2023, which were reflected in the February 2024 water bills. This increase will continue to be an annual increase. Why did the City have to raise rates?

- 1. Aging Infrastructure: Much of our water infrastructure is aging, and regular maintenance and upgrades are essential to ensure the continued functionality and safety of the system.
- 2. Population Growth: The increase in population has led to a higher demand for water services, necessitating the expansion and enhancement of our current infrastructure to meet this growing need.
- 3. Environmental Compliance: There are evolving environmental regulations that mandate improvements to our water treatment and distribution systems. Meeting these standards

is essential not only for regulatory compliance but also for the well-being of our community.

- 4. Rationale for Capital Improvement Charges: Implementing capital improvement charges on water bills is a fair and transparent way to generate the necessary funds for these vital projects. Here are some key reasons to consider this approach:
 - a. User-Pay Principle: Charging residents and businesses for capital improvements ensures that those who directly benefit from the enhanced water infrastructure contribute to the costs associated with these improvements.
 - b. Dedicated Funding Source: Establishing a separate line item on water bills for capital improvement charges creates a dedicated funding source, earmarked specifically for infrastructure projects. This ensures that funds are allocated appropriately and transparently.
 - c. Long-Term Financial Stability: By implementing these charges, we can create a sustainable financial model that enables us to plan and execute long-term capital improvement projects without relying solely on unpredictable budget allocations.

The water increases should have been implemented incrementally, decades ago so that the City had the funding necessary to continuously make improvements to the system. These capital improvement charges on water bills are a necessary and critical step to secure the future of our water infrastructure and maintain the high level of service our residents and businesses expect. We must also ensure that we remain in compliance with state regulations.

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City of the Village of Douglas Administration Report-Week of August 5th, 2024

Ferry Street: On August 5th, after many hours of investigative work and discovery by the Douglas DPW and the City Engineers, we were able to confirm where the sinkhole is located underground and that the areas of the culvert that we were able to see and touch are in severe condition, which means the road must remain closed for everyone's safety while we try to identify possible short-term options, if there are any available to us short of a full replacement. It is, however, inevitable that the culvert will need to be replaced soon and a long(er) term closure is likely. We are not there just yet. It is also important to note that there are water and sewer utilities running next to the culvert that must be protected at all costs to avoid the possibility of those services also being impacted.

This has been a priority for the City since the sinkhole was first discovered, and we will continue to keep this matter at the top of our list. We have an incredible team of engineers working closely with us.

The photos show the ditch where the sinkhole was identified, a piece of the culvert that was removed by hand indicating the weakness of that infrastructure, and the work to secure the embankment where the sinkhole is located to stabilize it with the goal to prevent further damage. We will keep the public posted on our findings and progress.

We want to thank the CVB for stepping up to help with the business signage that will be located on the route. Your support has been incredible, and we appreciate each one of you.



Douglas Marina: The buildings at Douglas Marina were demolished the week of August 5th. The area will be filled with three inches of topsoil and grass seed for now. The city is working on plans for the marina which include cleaning up the property and hopefully adding a few amenities like a pavilion, restrooms, and a picnic area for the public. This is going to take some time, but we are excited to see what the future holds for this property. The beam from the basket factory that was included in the interior of the house has been salvaged and delivered to the Historical Center in Douglas if anyone is interested in seeing a cool piece of history.



415 Wiley Road: Carbon Six Construction presented a plan for the 415 Wiley Road build-out to the City Council on Monday, August 5th. The next step is to move forward with a comprehensive cost estimate for the project which we hope to receive by mid-October. If everything stays on track, Carbon Six Construction can commence their work in January of 2025. The project would take approximately 7 months to complete.

Early Days of Voting/Primary Election: The City would like to give huge props to City Clerk Laura Kasper and all the incredible volunteers for a successful 9 days of early voting and the primary election. You all did a phenomenal job! Great leadership, Laura!

Also, a big thanks to Deputy Clerk Dawn Raza, Planning and Zoning Director Sean Homyen, Project Manager Jenny Pearson, and Jenn Tien, City Treasurer, for all their election assistance too! **The Red Flame Art:** Due to its current condition, the red flame art at Wade's Bayou is going to be deconstructed in October. It has served the area well, but there is quite a bit of wear and tear that is going to be difficult to fix, so it is going to be removed and hopefully we can look at another option soon. We want to thank the SCA for sharing this piece with us over the past few years.

Our engineering team is currently hard at work finalizing the plans necessary for the full closure and subsequent repair of the culvert. These plans are essential for ensuring that the project is completed safely and efficiently. Once the plans are in place, we will be able to move forward with the next steps, including the scheduling of the full closure and the commencement of the repair work.

We are also pleased to report that Allegan County has been actively assisting us in expediting the permit process with the State of Michigan. Their support has been invaluable in helping us navigate the regulatory requirements, and they are doing everything within their power to ensure that we receive the necessary approvals as quickly as possible. This collaboration with the county is a key factor in keeping the project on track. The city will be meeting with the City Engineers, Prien and Newhof and EGLE next week as a first step in the permitting process.

In addition, we are currently working on identifying and securing the funding needed to expedite this process. We understand the urgency of this project and are exploring all available options to ensure that the necessary resources are in place to move forward without delay.

Please rest assured that we are doing everything possible to address the Ferry Street Culvert issue promptly and effectively. I will continue to keep you informed of any significant developments as we progress through the planning and permitting stages. Thank you for your patience as we continue to work through this process.

The Committee shall consist of three (elected) representatives, one from each community, and three to four citizens, who will be selected by their respective councils or boards.

More information is forthcoming as it relates to applying for a board position. Currently, the City of Douglas is providing an opportunity for the City of Saugatuck and Saugatuck Township to review the committee by-laws with their council/boards before proceeding with this partnership.

Six Good Samaritans Honored for Saving a Man's Life After Car Plunges into Kalamazoo Lake: On September 16th, 2024, six brave individuals were honored for their lifesaving efforts after a man lost consciousness and his pick-up truck veered into Kalamazoo Lake. The quick and heroic actions of Richard Beaudreault, Jason Lott, Michael O'Brien, Maxwell Klemm, Amie Shanahan, and Austin Waalkes prevented a potential tragedy and saved the man's life.

The incident occurred on August 15th, 2024, when the driver, suffering a medical emergency, lost control of his vehicle and ended up submerged in the lake. Without hesitation, these six good Samaritans jumped into action, working together to break the truck's windows and pull the unconscious driver to safety. Their teamwork and quick response allowed the man to be rescued before emergency responders arrived. Douglas Police Chief Steve Kent praised the rescuers, saying, "These individuals went above and beyond, risking their own safety to save a life. Their actions were nothing short of heroic, and the community is truly grateful."

Mayor Cathy North added, "We are incredibly proud of these six residents whose quick thinking and courage made all the difference. They represent the very best of our community, and we thank them from the bottom of our hearts."

Public Message from the City of Douglas Mayor, Cathy North

RE: The 415 Wiley Road Build-Out Project: The City of Douglas had been exploring the purchase and redevelopment of the 415 Wiley Road property as part of its long-term plan to enhance city services and create new opportunities for the community. The aim is to relocate City Hall and the Police Department to this site, providing more space for city operations and opening up downtown buildings for sale. This move will help create new opportunities for businesses and housing in the heart of Douglas.

In the fall of 2023, the City officially purchased the 415 Wiley Road property. After reviewing the initial developer's plan, which projected \$12.5 million in rehabilitation costs, the City Council decided to discontinue that plan due to its excessive price. The city reissued a Request for Proposals (RFP) and received seven responses, ultimately interviewing five contractors. The city selected Carbon Six Construction to design the build-out for the first phase of the project, with the new estimate coming in 70% lower than the original—now ranging between \$2.7 and \$3.2 million.

There have been questions about how the project will be funded. The City Council's plan has consistently been to use proceeds from the sale of surplus city properties to cover the costs. Based on the bids received, the sale of these properties has the potential to fully fund the project, with a possible surplus that could be allocated to the general fund for future capital needs. The City has already engaged a realtor to assist in selling surplus properties in the near term, and potentially more in the future, as the 415 Wiley project progresses.

In line with state law, the city will use Public Act 34, which outlines the bond process for securing project funding. The City plans to issue bonds to finance the build-out, and the proceeds from surplus property sales will be used to pay down the bond debt. **Importantly, this project will not require any new taxes for residents or businesses. Any claims suggesting otherwise are inaccurate. ** The city is committed to ensuring that a sustainable and responsible funding source is in place before moving forward with a project of this magnitude.

This project will bring several benefits to the community, including a larger meeting space at 415 Wiley Road for public meetings and events. Additionally, it will transform a long-vacant building into a functional and valuable city asset.

Ferry Street Update: The City of Douglas is pleased to inform the community that the Allegan County Drain Commission has received the necessary pre-approval from EGLE, and we will continue to work together on the final approval for the replacement of the Ferry Street culvert. This advancement allows our city engineers to begin the bidding process in early November, with bids expected to open on December 3rd. This timeline provides adequate time, with a minimum two-week window, for posting and receiving bids, ensuring a fair and thorough selection process. Once the contract is awarded, the selected contractor will initiate planning and procurement of materials, aiming to start work as early as the first week of February, weather permitting.

Given the scope of this project, we must address several underlying complexities to ensure safety and longevity. The project area includes essential utility lines, which require specialized scheduling and relocation by qualified professionals to protect workers as cranes and other heavy equipment are used. The city engineers have dedicated the past several months to identifying experts in this field to minimize risk and uphold project safety.

Winter weather is a factor in our timeline, as seasonal conditions may cause delays; however, the city's goal remains to complete the project before Memorial Day 2025. Should weather conditions cooperate, we hope to complete the work even sooner, and we appreciate the community's patience as we work around these variables.

In addition to culvert replacement, we are examining options to extend the road to create a walkable pathway for residents and visitors, and discussions on this enhancement are ongoing. Additionally, the city will address a nearby water main that is approaching the end of its lifespan. The water main will be relocated and buried deeper to improve accessibility and protect it from frost, a proactive measure to help prevent future breaks and other issues.

This project is about much more than replacing a single culvert; it involves careful planning to protect surrounding utilities, reducing the potential for extended timelines and additional costs. If contractors can accelerate the timeline, we will work to do so, but we are mindful of winter conditions, material availability, and other factors that may impact scheduling. The city will continue to keep the public informed on our progress throughout the project. Thank you for your understanding and cooperation as we work to enhance infrastructure and safety in our community.

Root Beer Barrel: We are ecstatic to report that the Root Beer Barrel team had a fantastic 2024 season. Todd Martinson, who is managing the barrel, will be at the City Council meeting on Monday, November 4th at 6:00 p.m. to provide an update. We want to thank Todd for all of the work he did improving the grounds, including the addition of running water, bathrooms, more seating, parking, and options to use credit/debit cards for purchases both at the barrel and online. Todd has more plans for improvements in 2025 which he will outline at Monday's meeting. Thank you, Todd and team! You are a fantastic community partner!



Ferry Street Update: On Monday, September 30th, the Douglas City Council met to consider approving a resolution authorizing the Allegan County Drain Commissioner to expend the necessary funds for maintenance of the Warnock Drain above \$5000 per mile limit, an action that would ensure that the drain system remains functional and provides a financing and funding mechanism for repairing the drain. In addition, this option allowed for important permitting exemptions to occur as the Drain Commissioner projects have special culvert maintenance and repair exemptions with EGLE that municipalities do not have. The Allegan County Drain Commissioner had conducted an inspection of the Warnock Drain, which revealed the need for significant maintenance. The Council did approve the maintenance agreement with the Allegan County Drain Commission, and next steps are to commence with the bid process as soon as EGLE

gives the green light that we can move forward with the project. It is still the City's goal to have the work done at the culvert before Memorial Day 2025.

We are moving forward: At the December 2nd, 2024, City Council meeting, the council voted unanimously to move forward with the build-out of the 415 Wiley building for the future city hall and police department. Work is expected to commence this month.

Ferry Street: The plan is still on track to start work on the Ferry Street culvert project in late January. We look forward to this project moving forward and the road opening in spring of 2025.

66th Street Property: At the City Council meeting on December 2nd, 2024, the council approved an offer to purchase city owned surplus property on 66th Street in the amount of \$225,000.00. These funds will be added to a restricted account that will help pay for the Wiley property build-out.

DDA Informational Meeting/2024 Annual Report: The DDA will be presenting their annual report at the upcoming meeting on December 18th at 2:00 p.m. at Douglas City Hall. Another presentation will be made at the City Council meeting on January 6th, 2024, at 6:00 p.m.

City Council Meeting Time Change: Starting in January 2025, the Douglas City Council will be changing their meeting time from 7:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. This is not temporary and will be a permanent change.




